Call for papers - Scholarly monograph

"Teaching For the Future in Early Childhood Education"

Authors are invited to submit previously unpublished original research papers on the topic of monograph title: "Teaching for the Future in Early Childhood Education"

The manuscript will be published as an e-book by the University of Maribor Press, in collaboration with the University of Maribor, Slovenia and the University of Rijeka, Croatia.

The deadline for **submission of the working** title is July 1, 2022, and the deadline for **submission of the final manuscript is September 30, 2022.**

The focus of the manuscript should be on algorithmic thinking, teaching in early childhood education in general or teaching in subject or developmental domains and other topics important to the future of early childhood education.

Submission of a manuscript implies that the work described has not yet been published and that it is not under consideration for publication elsewhere. Authors wishing to include figures, tables, or text passages that have already been published elsewhere are required to obtain permission from the copyright owner(s).

All submitted manuscripts will be subject to double-blind review.

Authors will be asked to transfer copyright of the article to the publisher (or to grant the publisher exclusive publication and dissemination rights). This will ensure the widest possible protection and dissemination of the information under copyright laws.

Guidelines for Authors:

Manuscripts should be written in English. The length of each submitted manuscript should be between 35.000 and 40.000 characters, including spaces, tables, figures, and +20 references.

Manuscripts should be submitted using the provided Template.

Manuscripts should include an abstract, keywords, body of the manuscript, acknowledgments (if applicable) and references. It can also include an Appendix if necessary.

The body of the manuscript reporting empirical research should be written in IMRaD format (Introduction, Method, Results, Discussion and Conclusions).

The Introduction includes a review of the relevant literature and theoretical background ending with a research problem and research questions addressed, or a hypothesis stated.

The Method section of the manuscript should describe the participants or other materials used in the research, the instruments for gathering data, and the research design.

The Results section reports what was found in the study.

The Discussion section explains the meaning and significance of the results and provides answers to research questions.

The Conclusions should, rather than just repeating results, state well-articulated outcomes of the study, its limitations and briefly suggest future lines of research based on the findings reported in the manuscript, including the application of conclusions in practice.

Abstract and Key Words

Abstract should not exceed 150 words.

We encourage authors to use the following style of structured abstracts, but without headings: (1) Background: Place the question addressed in a broad context and highlight the purpose of the study; (2) Methods: briefly describe the main methods or treatments applied; (3) Results: summarize the article's main findings; (4) Conclusions: indicate the main conclusions or interpretations. The abstract should be an objective representation of the article

Please provide 4 to 5 key words or short phrases in alphabetical order after the abstract.

Acknowledgements

Acknowledgements of people, grants, funds, etc. should be placed in a separate section before the references.

Figures, tables and illustrations

Figures and tables should be incorporated into the adequate place in the manuscript text.

All photographs, graphs and diagrams should be referred to as a Figure and they should be numbered as Figure 1, Figure 2, etc. Complete and descriptive titles of the figures should be put below the figure.

Each table should be numbered as Table 1, Table 2, etc. Complete and descriptive titles of the tables should be put before the table. Tables and figures must be referred to in the text and numbered in order of their appearance.

References should follow the **American Psychological Association (APA, 7. ed)** style in alphabetical order.
